

Our School

Rívington Foundation Primary School has a long and fine tradition of offering education to the local community of Rívington and district. The school stands on the site first occupied by Rivington Free Grammar School, founded in 1566 with a Charter granted and signed by Queen Elizabeth I. This was requested by James Pilkington, Bishop of Durham who was born and brought up in Rivington.

2016 saw the 450th Anniversary of the founding of our School! Our Rivibethan Heritage Project 2016-17 celebrate and reflect Rivington at this time.

The main portion of the school was rebuilt in 1714 through the support of the Governing Body; the building had become very run down, nearly being destroyed by fire.. The present building became an elementary school in 1882 when the Grammar School was re-housed in what is now Rivington and Blackrod High School. The building has been owned by Shaws Charity since the early 20th Century; supporting School with a book gift for each child at Christmas.

In 1941 the school became a primary school when the last child of secondary age transferred to a secondary modern school and in 1951 the school was granted Voluntary Aided status (through the Shaws'). It then became a Foundation Primary School in January 2009, continuing to offer Primary education for children from 4 to 11.

Our EYFS classroom (Foundation Stage for Reception § Pre-School children) was opened in 2005. This provided the opportunity to offer education to children from the ages of 3 (pre-school year) to 11. In 2010 a Sure Start grant allowed an extensive and exciting outdoor play area to be added. The EYFS provision continues to be visited by other schools and nurseries, as an example of excellence in the learning environment.

All other classrooms have been completely refurbished on a rolling (and continuous) programme to provide modern and exciting working environments. Since Sept 2014 lighting upgrades have been completed in each classroom.

Each classroom now has Touchscreen technology, laptops are available for use throughout the curriculum, also a small amount of Ipads.

The Entry and signing in system has been updated for staff and visitors.

In Sept.2015 the Bursar's office moved to the ground floor, with the School Library moving upstairs. With space always at a premium, we continually seek to address the limitations of our beautiful and unique building whilst being part of the 21st Century. Our aim is to give our children the best ; an appreciation of the old, together with the advances available in the world today.
